THE PRIMARIES OVER... THE GENERAL ELECTION LOOMS

May 30 - June 3, 2008

Barack Obama, who has now secured enough delegates to win the Democratic nomination, enters the general election phase with a slight advantage over presumptive Republican nominee John McCain in a head-to-head matchup.

Still, there are signs in this poll Obama has some work to do coming out of a tough nomination fight: most Democrats think the length of the battle between Obama and Hillary Clinton has hurt rather than helped the party. And while many Democrats want Obama to pick Clinton as his vice presidential nominee, Obama's supporters are lukewarm to the idea.

If an Obama-McCain contest were held today, the Democrat would hold the edge.

IF THE ELECTION WERE TODAY, WOULD YOU VOTE FOR ...?

In this poll, 12% of self-identified Democrats nationwide say they'll back John McCain against Obama. That is higher than the 8% of Democrats who defected to George W. Bush from John Kerry in 2004.

And, after a long and tough primary battle, nearly a quarter of Democrats who wanted Senator Hillary Clinton to be the Democratic nominee now pick McCain over Obama in the General Election.

Women have been a key part of Hillary Clinton's constituency, and 13% of Democratic women say now they would back McCain. But 11% of Democratic men also pick McCain now.

McCain draws more independent voters than Obama, with one in ten undecided. In a matchup between McCain and Hillary Clinton, McCain also holds a lead.

Hillary Clinton, who had lately touted her electability in her campaign, would also come out ahead in a matchup with McCain, if such a contest were held today.

CAN THE DEMOCRATS COME TOGETHER?

The next big decision for the parties' nominees is to pick their vice presidential nominees, and some have suggested that uniting the two top Democratic contenders would make a "dream ticket."

However, Barack Obama's supporters are split on whether he should pick Hillary Clinton as his running mate.

Clinton's current backers feel differently: most of them want her to get the V.P. job. Overall, it is a popular idea among Democratic primary voters.

Most Democratic primary voters – those who participated in the voting – feel the length of this nomination contest has $\underline{\text{hurt}}$ their party's chances for November, because the candidates have weakened each other with criticisms during the fight. Only 38% think the long battle has tempered their nominee for the upcoming fall contest. Registered voters nationwide agree.

Two-thirds of Democratic primary voters, 65%, think there is a better way: to have things settled with a single national primary day instead of the current, staggered timeline.

Overall, Obama leads Clinton in the nomination preference of Democratic primary voters, as he does in the delegate count, though the margin is smaller than last month. In January the race was even, Clinton rallied somewhat in March, and Obama opened up a lasting lead this spring.

By a margin of 47% to 38%, Obama is also the preference of all voters who consider themselves Democrats, regardless of whether they decided to participate in a primary this year.

More than four in ten Democratic primary voters who now back Obama, or are undecided, say that they had once backed Hillary Clinton. In October of 2007, Clinton was the preference of a majority of would-be Democratic primary voters, 51%.

Looking back, more voters think former President Bill Clinton's involvement in Senator Clinton's campaign turned out to be a hindrance, instead of a help to the former First Lady. Democratic primary voters, in particular, feel the same.

Back in December 2007, Democratic primary voters said President Clinton's involvement in the campaign would make them more likely to back Hillary Clinton than not.

VIEWS OF THE CANDIDATES

John McCain has one significant advantage in this poll over both Obama and Clinton: the view that he would likely be an effective Commander-in-Chief. His ratings on this quality are much higher than Obama's or Clinton's.

However, a majority says it is at least somewhat likely any of the three candidates would be effective.

Obama, McCain and Clinton all continue to be seen as sharing Americans' values. Obama is most seen as caring <u>a lot</u> about the needs and problems of Americans, and on this measure he outdistances McCain by a large margin.

MCCAIN'S POTENTIAL NEGATIVES?: AGE AND PRESIDENT BUSH

As Barack Obama has increasingly turned his attention to John McCain in recent weeks, he has often argued that McCain's election would constitute a third term for President George W. Bush.

More than four in ten voters believe McCain would, indeed, generally continue George W. Bush's policies. And while about half think he would be different from the current President, nearly as many say he will be MORE conservative as think he will be LESS conservative.

Some observers have suggested that McCain's age - he would be the oldest President at a first inaugural - might be a concern, but most voters say age won't affect McCain's effectiveness as President if he's elected.

This poll was conducted among a random sample of 1,038 adults nationwide, including 930 registered voters, interviewed by telephone May 30-June 3, 2008. Phone numbers were dialed from RDD samples of both standard land-lines and cell phones. The error due to sampling for results based on the entire sample could be plus or minus four

percentage points. The error for subgroups is higher. The error for the sample of registered voters is plus or minus four points.
