UNESCO Director-General condemns killing of journalist Víctor Manuel Jiménez Campos in Mexico

Paris, 5 July 2024 - Audrey Azoulay, Director-General of UNESCO, has condemned the killing of radio journalist Víctor Manuel Jiménez Campos, who went missing on 1 November 2020. His body was found in the village of Villagrán, in the State of Guanajuato, in Mexico on 12 June 2024.

“I condemn the killing of journalist Víctor Manuel Jiménez Campos. Impunity for crimes against journalists must not be allowed to prevail, regardless of the time it takes. I therefore call on authorities to bring the perpetrators to justice,” said **Audrey Azoulay, UNESCO Director-General.**

Víctor Manuel Jiménez Campos worked as an independent journalist. He was kidnapped on 1 November 2020, while covering a baseball match in the city of Celaya and had not been seen or heard from since. His body was found and identified by Mexican authorities through forensic laboratory tests after three and a half years later.
