Records of medals at the Olympic Winter Games

20 February 2024

Olympic medals

In the beginning, it was stipulated that the medals for the Winter Games must be different from those of the Summer Games. Today, their design must take into account certain visual elements defined by the International Olympic Committee (IOC) and the Organising Committee of the Olympic Games (OCOG), with the IOC having the final approval. The Greek goddess of victory must not appear on the obverse. They must show the Olympic emblem, the full name of the Games in question, the name of the sport or discipline concerned and the OCOG's emblem.

Additionally, the Winter Games medals should reflect the visual look, plus cultural and aesthetic elements selected by the OCOG. For the Olympic Winter Games Beijing 2022, for example, the design was inspired by ancient Chinese artefacts in jade and in the form of a disc called "Bi". .
