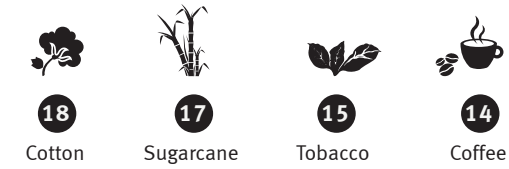


Products of Slavery and Child Labour

PRODUCTS OF CHILD AND FORCED LABOUR (BY NUMBER OF COUNTRIES)

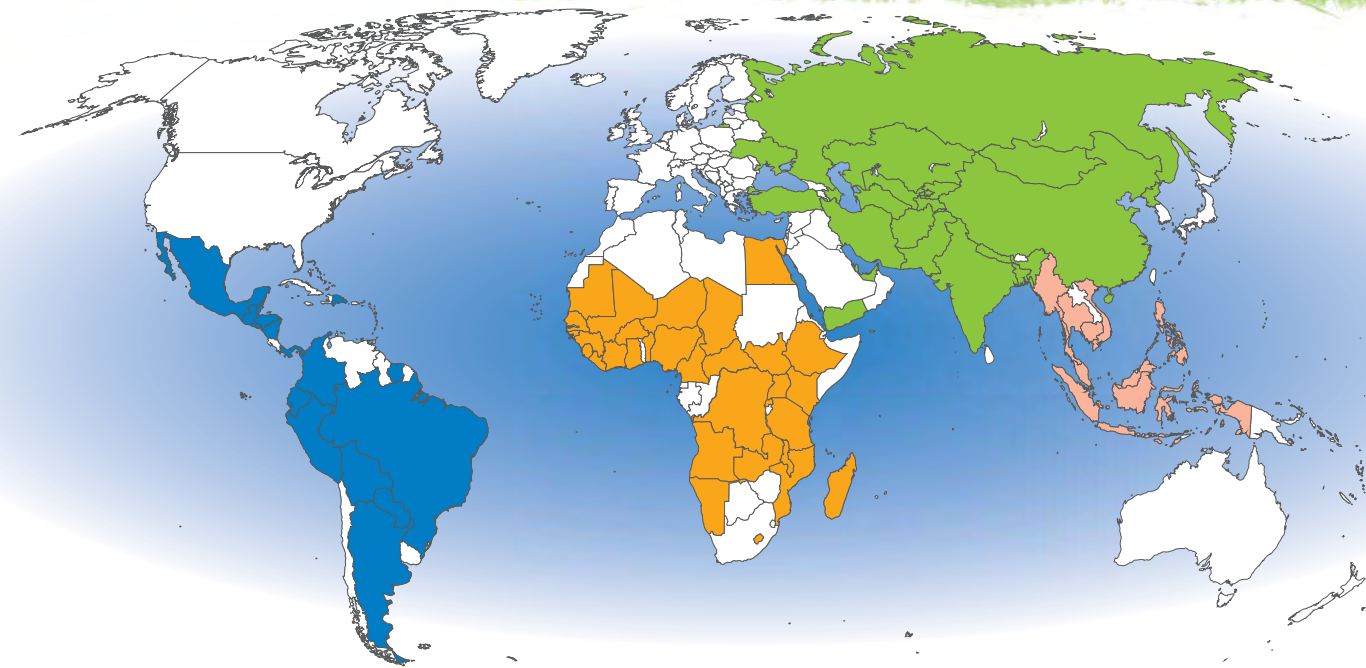

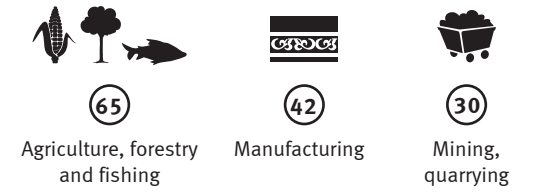
